Help them develop relational skills that help them deflect the harsh words and actions these situations can bring. Use this lesson to show kids what it means to put others first.

Lot and Abram Divide the Land

Genesis 13



Abram and Lot Go to Egypt

Abram and Lot had gone south into Egypt because of a famine in the land of Canaan (Genesis 12:10). In Egypt, Abram pretended to be Sarai's brother because Sarai was beautiful and Abram was afraid Pharaoh would kill him and take her. Pharaoh did bring Sarai into his palace, but he treated Abram very well, giving him sheep, cattle, servants, and a lot more. But then God began to inflict diseases on Pharaoh's household because of Sarai. When Pharaoh realized what was happening, he sent Abram and Sarai away.

Abram Returns to the Promised Land

Abram and Lot headed north, back to the land God had promised to Abram's descendants. This was another long journey of hundreds of miles. The travelers would travel from one source of food and water to the next, but they would have to stay at each place long enough for the flocks and herds to recover.

As Abram returned to Canaan, he again "called on the name of the Lord." Perhaps the incident in Egypt reminded Abram of who God is and of how blessed he was to be chosen by God.

Abram Concedes the Best Land to Lot

In Genesis 13:5 we discover for the first time that Lot was wealthy. It became apparent that a single area wasn't sufficient to support both of their families' flocks and herds.

In this situation and culture, etiquette dictated that Lot allow Abram to take whatever he deemed was rightfully his, because Abram was the more powerful and wealthy as well as the respected elder. So Abram's offer probably shocked Lot. Abram, to keep peace within his family, was willing to give up what was rightfully his. Lot, thinking only of himself, made a choice his entire culture would have deemed unthinkable.

God Reaffirms Promises to Abram

After Lot left, God spoke again to Abram, expanding on the promise made earlier. God's command to Abram to walk around the land likely came from the custom that a new landowner would walk the boundary of the land he was purchasing. God was telling Abram that he had given Abram that land.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus' message of an unselfish and servant heart is central to improving our relationships. Thank Jesus for showing us how to be servants to all, for his sake.

Think about a relationship that's important to you. How would it improve if you put each other first? Look for an opportunity in the coming week to put that other person first, and see if it changes anything. You can pray for that person and write your prayer here.

Sharing Stomp

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Have kids get into two single-file lines facing the wall with the large sheets of paper taped to it.

Say: Think of something you own that you could share with someone else. Give kids time to think. Then hand the first person in each line a marker.

Say: On "go" the first person in each line will stomp to the paper on the wall and draw a picture of something that could be shared with another person. When you finish drawing, stomp back to your line and hand the marker to the next person. When both teams have finished drawing, each team will try to guess the items the other team drew.

Have kids complete the task. Encourage them to make quick drawings, and lead children in cheering on the other kids as they draw.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain how you chose what to draw.
- Tell about something you were mad that you had to share.
- Why is it good to share with others?

Say: Our Bible Point for today tells us that GOD WANTS US TO PUT OTHERS FIRST. When we share our things and time with others, it's a way to put others first. Today we'll hear about a man named Abram and how he put another person first.





Lot's and Abram's Sheep

What You'll Do

Set the supplies on a table. Give kids each a My Bible Fun page. Say: In Genesis 13, we'll hear about a man named Abram. Abram had to give something away to take care of another person.

Have kids cut out the sheep masks from their pages and tape a craft stick to the back of the mask as a handle, being careful not to cover up the words. Then have kids decorate the masks with the cotton balls. As kids make their masks, invite each child to tell about someone who's shared something with him or her.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why were you glad that person shared with you?
- Why do you think it's good to share your things with other people?
- Tell about a way you can follow that person's example this week.

Say: As we read the Bible today, we'll hear about some people living in a place where there wasn't enough food and water on their land. We'll learn how a man named Abram put others first, and how ▶ GOD WANTS US TO PUT OTHERS FIRST. too.

Lot and Abram Divide the Land

What You'll Do

Invite the children to sit in a circle on the floor while holding their sheep masks. Open your Bible to Genesis 13, and show kids the passage.

Say: In Genesis 13, it says Abram owned sheep and other animals. So whenever I talk about the sheep as we're hearing what happened, you'll hold your sheep mask to your face and say "baa, baa." Have kids practice doing this once or twice. If you didn't do the "Lot's and Abram's Sheep" activity, simply have kids make the noises without the masks.

Say: The Bible says God sent Abram on a long trip. Abram took his wife; his servants; his nephew, Lot; and his sheep [baa, baa] and other animals. They moved from place to place so they could find enough food for everyone's sheep [baa, baa] and other animals. Soon they realized that the land they were staying on didn't

have enough food and water for both Abram's sheep [baa, baa] and Lot's sheep [baa, baa]. The men who watched Abram's sheep [baa, baa] and the men who watched Lot's sheep [baa, baa] began to argue over whose animals had the right to the food and water on the land.

Show children the two Bible Person Masks. Invite two kids to stand with you, and give each one a Bible Person Mask. Have one child pretend to be Abram and the other pretend to be Lot. Explain that the child playing Abram will step forward and hold out his or her hand as though speaking to the rest of the group when Abram speaks. The child portraying Lot will do the same when Lot speaks. Remind the other children to continue being sheep.

Say: One night Abram went to Lot's tent and said, "Lot, we need to stop this arguing between our families. We need to start getting along with each other."

Lot said, "I think we need to stop arguing, too."

Abram pointed to all the land around them and said, "Look at all this land. If you go left, I'll go right. And if you go right, I'll go left."

Show children the "Lot Chooses" poster, and say: Lot looked around and saw the beautiful land around the Jordan River. This land was full of green grass and trees. He said to himself, "That land would be wonderful for my sheep" [baa, baa]. This land was the best of all the land, and Abram offered it to Lot. Lot said to Abram, "I'll take that land over there by the Jordan River."

Abram said, "That's good. I'll take that land over there." Abram pointed to land that was rocky and not as beautiful as the land Lot chose. Abram left Lot and returned to his family, his sheep [baa, baa], and his other animals.

Have Lot sit; then say: After Abram left Lot, God stopped Abram and spoke to him.

Play the "The Voice of God" (track 22 on the CD), and have Abram continue to act out what's happening.

Have the child portraying Abram sit down, and collect the masks.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What stands out to you about which land Abram and Lot picked?
- Explain whether you think you treat others more like Abram did or like Lot did.
- How is the way Abram treated Lot like the way God wants us to treat others?



Say: God promised to always give Abram everything he needed. He never had to worry about not having enough. Even though Lot picked the better-looking land, God made Abram's land better because Abram put Lot first. And when Abram had the chance, he was generous with others, like God was generous with him.

• GOD WANTS US TO PUT OTHERS FIRST as Abram put Lot first—Abram knew that God always takes care of us.





We Can Be Generous

What You'll Do

Say: Today, we saw how Abram stopped a family quarrel by being generous. His actions were an example of our Key Verse from Luke 6:31: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). Have kids repeat the verse with you.

Put kids in groups of three. Say: In your groups, think of two generous things you can do this week to help you get along with friends and family better.

Give kids a few minutes to think of their two actions. Listen to the groups, and be prepared to help any groups that seem to be struggling. When time is up, gather everyone together.

Say: Now each group will share with all of us the two generous actions you decided you could do this week, and I'll write them down.

Give each group a chance to share its actions while you write them on a whiteboard or a sheet of poster board. Be sure to write plenty of choices.

After all the groups have shared, say: These are all great examples of generous ways we can treat others during the coming week. But it'll be hard to remember to do all of these generous actions next week. So let's vote for the three ideas you like best.

Read each idea on the list, and have kids vote. After voting, have kids write the three winning actions in the section titled "How Can You Be Generous?" on their My Bible Fun pages. You may need to help some children write these down.

Say: Let's sing a song that'll help us get ready to put others first this week. Hand out copies of the lyrics, and then play "Do to Others" (Luke 6:31) (track 21 on the CD).
