
Genesis 12:1-8

Abram Follows God's Direction

Genesis 12:1-8



Abram Obeys God's Command to Move

"Sell everything you can't carry, leave your friends and extended family, bring your wife and belongings. You'll probably never come back here again, but don't worry about that—I'll show you where to go." This was essentially God's command for Abram.

What trust in God it took for Abram to leave his home and everything familiar, and set out for an unknown destination, having only God's command to go on! Abram also had the worries of keeping intact the things he took with him. In those days, traveling with herds of livestock through unknown territory was treacherous. Besides, Abram was 75 years old! But he trusted and followed God.

Abram's Traveling Companions

What helped Abram on his way was a trusting relationship with God and the promises of blessing that would benefit not only his household but "all the peoples on earth"!

Lot, Abram's nephew, went along but probably not just for companionship or adventure. It was a disgrace in that culture to not have descendants, and Abram realized that he and his wife were getting too old to have children. Abram may have asked Lot to go because Abram had no offspring of his own to take charge if Abram died or became incapacitated.

We're told nothing about the journey, but the trip from Haran to Bethel was approximately 400 miles, much of it over rough desert land. Conflict with local residents was likely a daily occurrence, and the trip probably took a month or more.

God Blesses Abram for Obeying

Abram completed the journey in faith, and then, as described in Genesis 12:7, the Lord appeared to him. God had spoken to Abram earlier, but now God appeared and confirmed the promise he had made to Abram back at Haran: The fertile land before him would one day belong to his descendants. That meant the promises were beginning to come true!

Abram built an altar to honor God through worship. "Calling upon the name of the Lord" meant worshipping him and acknowledging him as God. Abram knew that God had blessed him already and that many more blessings were still to come.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus taught us how to trust in God and proved that God won't let us down. May Jesus' example inspire you to have the courage to trust as Abram did!

Think about an experience that challenged you to trust God. If you knew then what you know now, how would your trust level have been different? With that in mind, pray for each of the individuals in your ministry, asking God to strengthen and inspire them all to trust him. You can write your prayer here.

Time to Pack

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Give each child a My Bible Fun page. Distribute crayons and scissors, and have kids cut out the suitcase.

Say: Pretend that you and your family are moving. Decide which of your things to take with you, and then draw one of them in the heart inside your suitcase. (It's on the opposite side of the paper.) Now finish your suitcase by folding on the center line.

Let kids share what they took when they're done drawing.

Say: No matter where we go or how long our journey is, WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD. Our Key Verse, Proverbs 3:5, tells us that! Open your Bible to Proverbs 3:5, and show kids the passage. Then read the passage aloud: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5). Have kids repeat the verse with you.

Hand out copies of the lyrics page, and say: **Now let's worship God by singing our Key Verse together!**

Play "Trust in the Lord" (Proverbs 3:5-6) (track 20 on the CD), and encourage the children to sing along.

Say: "Packing up" the Key Verse in your suitcase will remind you that no matter where you go, God is always with you and you can trust him.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did you decide what to bring in your suitcase?
- What things do you know about God that you can carry with you to help you each day?
- How can those things help you trust God with your whole heart?

Say: Our Bible Point this week tells us that WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD.

That's something we can carry in our minds every day to help us not worry wherever we go and whatever we do. Today we'll hear about a man named Abram who always trusted God, even when he had to pack up and move.



Abram Follows God

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 12, and show kids the passage. Then help kids find the verses in their own Bibles.

Say: Today we'll hear how Abram and his wife, Sarai, trusted God when he told them to move to a new land.

Ask a child to point to the place on the Bible Timeline that shows Abram obeying God.

Say: In Genesis 12, the Bible says God told Abram to move. What God said to Abram back then would be kind of like this today: "Sell everything you can't carry with you, leave all your friends and relatives, get your wife and belongings in the car, and start driving. You'll probably never come back here again, but don't worry about that—I'll show you where to go."

Have kids turn to a friend and talk about what they would and wouldn't like about God telling them to move like that.

Abram Follows God Easy Prep

If you didn't do the previous activity, use paper bags as the "suitcases." If you haven't already done so, punch out the white eyes from the masks. Push the metal ends of the elastic pieces through the small holes above the ears on the white-haired male and female masks.



Say: It seems like it'd be a hard thing to do—to just pack up and leave everything behind that you know. But Abram trusted God and did what God told him to do. He took Sarai, all his riches, and all his animals, and he left his home.

Choose two children to be Abram and Sarai, and give them the Bible Person Masks. Tell children to pick up their suitcases to take on the journey.

Say: Let's pretend that these two are Abram and Sarai. We have our suitcases—let's get ready to move!

Have children take their suitcases and follow Abram and Sarai through the room, winding around chairs, under tables, or out into the hall. If you have time, allow two or three pairs of children to take turns wearing the Bible Person Masks. Have the group sit in another part of the room or church for the rest of the activity.

When your group has "relocated," retrieve the masks, and have the kids sit in a circle.

Say: When God told Abram to move, Abram was 75 years old. That's probably about as old as your great-grandfather! Abram and Sarai had to travel many miles through the desert, and the trip probably took a month or more. The only food they had was whatever they took with them, and they had to find water to drink along the way. At night they had to sleep on the ground. Abram might've wanted to turn around and go home many times, but he trusted God to show him the way and to keep him safe.

Have kids turn to a friend and talk about a time they did something really hard that lasted a long time

Say: After a long, hard journey, Abram and his family finally stopped at a place called Shechem (SHEK-uhm) and set up their camp beside an old tree. God was pleased with Abram because Abram had trusted him. God appeared to Abram and told him that all the land would one day belong to Abram's children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

Have kids turn to a friend and talk about a time they got great rewards—and what they did to thank the people who gave them the rewards.

Say: When God rewarded Abram, Abram built an altar to God. An altar is a special place to worship God. Abram built the altar so everyone would know that God had visited him in that place. After that, Abram traveled a little farther and set up camp again. He built another altar and worshipped God there.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why was what Abram did a great way to show God he trusts him?
- Tell about a time you had to do something tough.
- What can you do to show God you trust him in tough times?

Say: Sometimes traveling to a new place can be scary. We don't know what to expect or who to trust. But just as Abram learned to put his trust in God, we can know that God is with us, too. God will lead us where he wants us to go. ▶ WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD to take care of us. When we do that, traveling to a new place is fun!





Moving Day

What You'll Do

Gather the children in a circle.

Say: Imagine that your family is moving to another town and you can take only one thing with you. Let's play a game where you'll get to decide what to take. I'll give you two choices, and you'll stand with other people who chose the same thing. Ready? How about [item] or [item]? If you would choose [item], stand over there (point to an area). If you would choose [item], stand over there (point to another area). Give kids several choices such as those on the following list, and after each set of choices, have kids talk to other kids nearby about why they picked each option.

- toothbrush or hairbrush
- book or music player
- pillow or blanket
- extra shoes or extra shirt
- water or snack

After several minutes, gather the children in a circle.

Say: Abram and Sarai had to move, but they didn't know where they were going. They learned to trust God, like our Key Verse says: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5). Have kids repeat the verse with you.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain how easy or hard it was to decide what to take.
- Explain whether it's easy or hard for you to trust God in times when you don't know what's going to happen or you have a hard choice.
- What can you do to trust God with all your heart in times like that?

Say: We learned today that WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD! He wants us to trust him and seek him every day. Abram and Sarai were so sure of God that they moved everything they had to a new place without knowing where they were going. We can trust God like that, too.

Daily Challenges

Say: Let's think about how ▶ WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges in their My Bible Fun pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- Invite a friend over to your house. Give him or her a tour of your house, and then talk about the journey God asked Abram to take to a new home and how Abram trusted God.
- Each night before you go to bed, thank God for a way he took care of you that day. Pray that you'll be able to trust him to keep taking care of you.
- Think of a struggle your family is having, and then tell your parents why you trust God to take care of your family.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Talk With Kids

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas. Allow time.

Say: WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD. He led Abram to a great new place, and when we follow him and trust him, he'll lead us to great new places, too. Let's show that we trust God by following through on our Daily Challenges this week.
