

# Jesus Teaches About Commitment Mark 8:31-38

F irst- and second-graders can decipher between those who mean them harm and those who love and care for them. As they learn that Jesus loves and cares for them above all else, they can be led to follow Jesus with abandonment. Use this lesson to help kids understand what it means to follow Jesus with their words and actions.

# Jesus Teaches About Commitment

Mark 8:31-38

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

# Jesus Rebuked Peter

The disciples were likely counting on a great earthly kingdom in which Jesus would lead the Jews in overthrowing the Romans and would place his disciples in important positions. Jesus' statements didn't go along with those expectations! Peter wanted Jesus to change his mind and forget all this talk about dying.

Peter's thinking was based on wrong assumptions because he saw things from a purely human point of view. Here we see a clear statement about what it means to follow Jesus. Too often we think of God as a powerful being who can help us advance our own agendas. Instead, truly following Jesus means listening to what he says, discovering his will for our lives, and then obediently following, no matter how attractive or repulsive that may seem to us at the time.

### Jesus Challenged the Crowd

A crowd had apparently gathered to hear Jesus, and he wanted to clarify his meaning. This is not a description of what some call "easy believism." Instead, Jesus points out how denying oneself means turning away from selfish, self-protective attitudes and seeking the true humility and faith God wants to see in us.

What does it mean to take up your cross? For Jesus' disciples to each take up his own cross didn't mean just to endure suffering. It meant to accept fully the suffering they would face because of their faith in Christ. Jesus wanted his disciples to know that their faith came with a cost.

# Stand Firm in Faith

As he spoke of what it means to follow him, Jesus knew that many in the crowd around him wouldn't

be followers he would recognize as his own when he returns. Our generation is much like that of Jesus' day. People who claim to be religious—or even Christian often shy away from bold witnessing for Jesus. It's easy to say you believe in God, but it's much more difficult to confess you're a Jesus-following Christian.

## The Jesus Connection

Humans are willing to sacrifice a lot for the sake of those they love. Your relationship with Jesus *will* require sacrifice, risk, and loyal commitment—but it's all worth it!

How can you take up your cross? Try living out the "Joy" acronym: Pray about one specific way you'll put *Jesus* first (such as spending time with him first thing each day), put *others* second (such as washing a friend's car), and put *yourself* last (such as giving up time watching TV in order to help someone else). You can write your prayer here.

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# The Human Tunnel

### What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together. Say: Let's begin with a fun game called the Human Tunnel. Everyone line up. Help kids get in a single file line, standing with legs wide enough apart for other children to crawl underneath.

Say: When I say "go," the last person in line will get on his or her hands and knees and crawl through the tunnel to the front of the line. Then he or she will stand at the front of the line and become part of the tunnel again. Check for understanding. Have a child demonstrate if necessary. Then say: Here's the catch: As soon as you become the last person in line, drop to your hands and knees and begin crawling through the tunnel, too. Check for understanding and then say: Go! Have kids continue the game until each child crawls through the tunnel.

### Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain what was easy or hard about following the person in front of you in this game.
- Tell about some people you follow in life.
- What makes you decide whether to follow someone?

Say: For some of you, it might've been hard to keep up with the person you were following. And for some, you might've wanted to move more quickly than that person. Today we'll learn that when we follow Jesus, he'll always take us in the right direction, at the right speed. We'll learn what it means to ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS with our words and our actions.

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## **Proud Followers**

### What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Romans 1:16, and show kids the passage. Say: Our Key Verse today

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reminds us to be proud of God's message. Listen while I read it: "I am not ashamed of the gospel" (Romans 1:16). Have kids repeat the Key Verse with you several times.

Say: The gospel is the good news that Jesus forgives us when we believe in him. So our Key Verse says we can be happy when Jesus is our friend, not ashamed.

Say: *Ashamed* can be a tricky word, too. Let's see if we can get an idea of what *ashamed* means. Put kids in pairs. Number one child in each pair "1" and the other "2."

Say: You and your partner are good friends. Let's say you see your good friend talking with a group of kids. Have all the 1s gather in a group together and pretend to talk to each other. Have the 2s disperse away from the group of 1s.

Say: You might wave to your friend and join the group. Have the 2s wave to their partners.

Say: **But when you join your friend, he or she ignores you.** Have the 2s approach the 1s as the 1s turn away from their partners. Direct the 1s to keep their backs to 2s, cross their arms, and put their noses in the air. Direct 2s to try to talk to their partners as 1s continue to ignore them.

Say: When you see your good friend, it's natural to expect him or her to be happy to see you, too. In this experience, the 1s showed what it might be like if they were ashamed to be friends with someone.

Say: Let's give 1s the chance to see what it might be like to be a 2 in this experience. Have kids switch roles and repeat the same process.

Say: Our Key Verse reminds us not to be ashamed to be friends with Jesus. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead kids in saying the verse: "I am not ashamed of the gospel" (Romans 1:16). Have kids repeat the Key Verse with you several times.

### Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was it like when your partner acted ashamed of you?
- Why do you want to show Jesus you're friends with him?
- What can you do this week to show Jesus you're glad to be his friend?

Say: In our experience, it didn't feel good to have our friends turning their backs to us. Like that, Jesus doesn't want us to turn our backs to him. Our Key Verse reminds us to be glad to be friends with Jesus. And when we ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS by being a friend to him, we show him that we're not ashamed of the gospel.

# **Deny Yourself**

## What You'll Do

Say: Today we're learning what it means to ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS. In the Bible, Jesus tells his friends that following him is different from what people sometimes think.

Say: Let's play a game to get a picture of what that means. Have kids line up, with their backs against one wall of your room. Point to the wall opposite where they're standing, and say: The object of the game is for you to get to the other wall, but here's the catch: You can only move forward by stepping on scraps of paper I set on the floor. You can move in any direction, as long as you're only stepping on the scraps of paper. Ready? Check for understanding, and then randomly place single scraps of paper in front of the children. You can put a few in front of one child, or you can put one in front of each child before moving back to the first child to place another line. You can also put one scrap in front of two children and let them decide who goes first. The important thing is that you vary how you place the papers throughout the game so that children are moving at different paces and possibly in different directions. Continue until all the children reach the opposite wall.

After the game, have the children sit in a group.

- Ask:
  - What was it like to try to finish the game? Allow time.

Say: Let's read from the Bible so we can make a connection from our game to following Jesus. Open your Bible to Mark 8:31-38, and show it to kids. Say: In the first few verses, Jesus explained some of the things that would happen to him in the future. Since he's God, he already knew he'd be hung on a cross and killed, then come back to life three days later. But his friends didn't know any of this. And Jesus' friend Peter didn't want Jesus to be hurt or killed, so he told Jesus to stop talking. Peter didn't understand God's plan.

Say: In our game, I knew how you'd get to the other wall, but you didn't. What are some ways our game was like or unlike Jesus' conversation with his friends? Allow time.

Say: Like in our game, Jesus' friends didn't understand what was going to happen or why it would happen, but Jesus knew it was the perfect plan that would turn out right.

Show the "People Follow Jesus" poster. Then say: **After Jesus told about God's plan, he explained what it means to follow him.** Read Mark 8:34-35.

Distribute the Lesson 1 My Bible Fun pages to kids, and point out the "Deny Yourself" activity. Say: Look at the first picture of the boy. He turned off the TV so he can take out the trash for his mom. He might really rather watch TV, but he gave up what he wanted so he could help his mom. When he gave up watching TV, he was denying himself—kind of like what Jesus was telling the people to do in the Bible. Write or draw something at home that you can give up to help your parents. Allow time.

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Let a few kids show the pictures they drew, and then say: When we give something up to do what we know God wants us to do, that's how we take up our crosses.

Point out the second picture on the My Bible Fun pages. Say: **This girl's sharing her lunch with a friend who didn't bring any food to school. She might really rather eat all the food she brought, but she's willing to give up what she wants so she can help her friend. When she gave up part of her lunch, she was denying herself. Write or draw a way you can give up something to help a friend.** Allow time. If kids seem stumped, suggest that kids share toys, help friends with schoolwork instead of playing at recess, or invite a friend to join a game. Then let a few kids show the pictures they drew.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- Based on our game and the pictures, what do you think it means to follow Jesus?
- What can you do this week to show Jesus you want to follow him?

Say: In our game, you knew how to get to the other wall, but you didn't have complete control over when or where you would step. Like that, Jesus' friends didn't know exactly what was going to happen next, but Jesus helped them know what it means to ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS. We, too, can follow Jesus by paying attention to him and by denying ourselves like the kids in the pictures did.

# **Praise Parade**

### What You'll Do

Have kids form two groups, and have groups stand shoulder to shoulder, facing each other as if they're waiting for a parade to pass between them.

# Say: Sometimes people celebrate good things by having a parade. Since we're learning about following Jesus, let's celebrate by having a Praise Parade!

Play "Sing Unto the Lord" (track 3 on the CD). Let each child walk between the two groups, acting out a way he or she can follow Jesus. For example, the child may pretend to be reading a Bible, praying, or helping someone down the street. Every time the song says "God is great," have all the kids jump into the air with their arms raised.

After the parade, gather kids in a circle.

### Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you like about celebrating Jesus in the parade?
- What about Jesus is worth celebrating?



#### Praise Parade Supplies

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Why might those things make you want to follow Jesus?

Say: It's great to celebrate following Jesus. When we think of how he died on the cross for us, we can  $\blacktriangleright$  COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS by taking up our crosses, too. We know he's worth celebrating and worth following because we know his way is best for us. This week, let's remember we're proud to follow Jesus.



## The Jesus Club

### What You'll Do

Say: We read in the Bible today about what it means to  $\blacktriangleright$  COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS. When we believe in him and follow him, it's like we're part of his club. Jesus wants everyone to be proud of him—he wants everyone to be in his club! Sometimes when people join a club, they wear badges to show that they're club members. Let's make badges now to show that we're proud to follow Jesus and to be part of the Jesus Club!

Give each child a Lesson 1 My Bible Fun. Set out scissors, tape, and markers. Have kids cut out their badges. Then give each child a punch-out cross, and let kids write their names on the crosses. Next, show kids how to tape the crosses in the center of their badges. Then let kids decorate their badges however they please. Finally, help kids each use masking tape to tape a safety pin to the back of the badge. Help kids pin the badges to their clothing.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What things do you like about being in Jesus' club?
- What are some ways you show you're part of Jesus' club?

Say: Jesus wants everyone to be a part of his club. He wants everyone to follow him because he's God and he knows everything about the past, the present, and the future, like we read in the Bible today. When we ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, we make a decision to trust him because we know his way is best.

## **Daily Challenges**

### What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about how we COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges in their My Bible Fun pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- Lead your family in a prayer, asking God to help you follow Jesus, and then make the Jesus Club badges together.
- Tell a friend at school what it means to follow Jesus.
- Follow through on doing one of the things you drew on your My Bible Fun page.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

### Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.

Say: Jesus helped his friends and all the people around understand what it means to follow him. This week, let's ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS. We can even show that we're committed to following Jesus by doing our Daily Challenges.

## Weaving Faith at Home

Send the letter to parents home with your kids or give it to parents when they pick up their children. This is a great way to show families they're important to your church and to support their role as spiritual leaders to their children.

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about how we commit to follow Jesus. Kids can also do the activities in the "HomeConnect" section of their My Bible Fun pages with their families.
