

God Speaks to Samuel

1 Samuel 3:1-21

irst- and second-graders may get a little confused when you talk to them about hearing God. Since they are concrete thinkers and trust what you say, they may leave this lesson expecting to hear an audible voice. It's important to communicate to your kids that God seldom speaks audibly to his children. Help them understand that God speaks to them through their parents, through other Christians, through their own consciences and impressions, and most important, through the Bible.

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1 Samuel 3:1-21



Samuel Thinks Eli Calls Him in the Night

Both Samuel and Eli had gone to bed for the night when God called out to Samuel. Perhaps Samuel was accustomed to calls for assistance from Eli, who was losing his eyesight (1 Samuel 3:2). At first, Eli might well have thought Samuel had been dreaming when he heard a voice calling his name. First Samuel 3:7 explains that Samuel "did not yet know the Lord." This doesn't mean that Samuel didn't understand who the Lord is or hadn't really been serving him; he simply had never before received a direct revelation from God. So it is not surprising that the boy continued to return to Eli when he was called.

When Eli realized that Samuel was hearing a call from God, he didn't get up, go with Samuel, and hear what God had to say. He knew that whatever God wanted to say to Samuel was between God and the boy. The prophecy Samuel received echoed the words of a prophecy Eli had received from a "man of God" earlier. Because Eli's sons had dishonored God in their priestly duties, that prophecy predicted the death of Eli's sons and their replacement by a priest who would be faithful to God (1 Samuel 2:27-36).

Samuel Shares God's Difficult Message With Eli

The prophecy given to Samuel made it clear that Eli had not raised his sons properly and that Eli would be punished. As difficult as it must have been for Samuel to pronounce judgment upon the priest he served, Samuel faithfully reported to Eli what God had said.

From 1 Samuel 3:19-21 it is clear that this was the first of many times God spoke to Samuel. Samuel grew up listening to God. The phrase "from Dan to Beersheba" (1 Samuel 3:20) was used to describe the entire Promised Land. Samuel became God's mouthpiece to the nation of Israel. He listened when

God appeared to him, and "Samuel's word came to all Israel" (1 Samuel 3:21).

The Jesus Connection

In our relationship with Jesus, God sometimes speaks to us through the Bible or God's people. When he does, he wants us to listen and obey.

What does it mean to really listen to God? What might

Responsive Racing

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Say: Hello, everyone!

Pause for children to respond. If they don't, repeat the greeting until they do.

Ask:

Can anyone tell me what it means to respond?

Say: To respond means to react to something, doesn't it? When I say "hello," you react, or respond, by saying "hello" back to me. When someone tells a funny joke, we respond by laughing. If we bump the funny bone in our elbows, we might respond by rubbing our elbows. We're going to start today with a game about responding. In this game, you're all going to be race-car drivers.

Have students line up in single file and place their hands on the shoulders of the person in front of them. Point out an invisible loop in the room that children can follow around as a racetrack. Explain that children will keep their hands on each other's shoulders as they walk in single file around the "track."

Hold up a green piece of construction paper, and explain that when the green "flag" is waving, kids can move quickly around the racetrack. Hold up a yellow piece of construction paper, and explain that when the yellow flag is waving, everyone must move in slow motion. Then hold up a red piece of construction paper. Explain that when the red flag is waving, they must stop, and the last "driver" in line will skip up to the front of the line and lead the race.

Say: On your mark! Get set! Go!

Wave the green flag, and continue waving it for a few laps. Then wave the yellow flag for a few seconds. Remind children to move in slow motion. Alternate flags a few times, and then hold up the red flag so that a new person can lead the race. Continue switching flags, and allow every child a chance to lead the race. End the race, and lead children in giving high fives to one another.

Ask the children to sit down as a group for a discussion.



Ask:

- What did you respond to during the race?
- How was responding to the flags like responding when a parent, teacher, or friend directs you?
- How should we respond when God directs us?

Say: Today we're going to hear about a boy who learned how to respond to God. Our Key Verse from the Bible tells us what we can say to respond to God.

Open your Bible to 1 Samuel 3:10, and show the verse to the children.

Say: First Samuel 3:10 says, "Speak, for your servant is listening." Ask children to repeat the Key Verse with you a few times.

Say: This Key Verse comes right from our Bible story. In fact, the boy in our story actually says the Key Verse! Let's find out more about the boy who responded to God by saying, "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10).



EXPLORATION

Who Called?

What You'll Do

Show the Bible Timeline. Then say: The Bible tells us what a boy named Samuel learned about responding to God. Samuel lived in the temple, which was sort of like a church, and worked for an old priest named Eli. Samuel's room was near Eli's room so that Samuel could hear Eli if he called during the night. Let's pretend you're all Samuels, sleeping in your room in the temple. Over there is Eli's room. Designate a corner of the room to be Eli's bedroom. I'll play the story on the CD, and you can follow the directions you hear.

Have kids lie down on the floor and pretend to sleep. Play "God Calls Samuel" (track 6 on the CD), leading kids in following the directions they hear from Samuel.

When the segment is finished, have children sit with you on the floor.

Say: Eli told Samuel to respond to God by saying these words from 1 Samuel 3:10: "Speak, for your servant is listening." Have children repeat the Key Verse. After Samuel responded with these words, God talked to Samuel about his plans. The Bible says God was with Samuel and called him many times throughout his life.

Ask:

- Why do you think Samuel didn't recognize God's voice at first?
- How does God talk to us today?
- What did Samuel learn about responding to God?

Say: Our Bible Point tells us that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO LISTEN AND FOLLOW WHEN HE DIRECTS US. Remember, our Key Verse tells us what Samuel's response was when God called him: "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10).

Let's play a game to show us how Samuel might've felt that night when God first called him.

Instruct children to sit in a circle, and then explain the game. Say that you'll choose a volunteer, who will stand facing a corner and hide his or her eyes. Once the volunteer's eyes are closed, you'll choose one student to be the caller. When the volunteer turns around to face the group, the caller will say the volunteer's name and the volunteer must respond with "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10). The volunteer is to try to figure out who called his or her name.

The catch is, children must all mouth the volunteer's name at the same time to throw him or her off. The caller will say the volunteer's name three times. Make sure you help the children synchronize their moving mouths all three times. If the volunteer guesses correctly, the caller will become the new volunteer. If the volunteer cannot identify the caller, the caller may reveal himself or herself. Then select a new volunteer.

Begin the game by choosing a volunteer and having him or her face a corner with eyes closed. If time allows, give everyone a chance to be the volunteer. Then have kids form pairs to answer the following questions. After each question, invite partners to share their answers with the rest of the class.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was it like having to guess who was calling your name?
- How did you respond when you figured out who the caller was?
- How was the way Samuel responded to the voice he heard like the way you responded to the caller?
- How should we respond when God directs us?

Say: Remember, our Key Verse tells us what Samuel's response was when God called him: "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10). Samuel had to learn who was directing him, and he had to learn a good way to respond. Once he learned, Samuel became a great prophet. That means that Samuel listened to God and told the people what God said. Let's find out how we can learn to respond to God every day!

God Says

What You'll Do

Say: Let's play a game to remind us to respond to God. This game is like Simon Says, but it's called God Says instead.

Choose one person to be the director. The director should stand in front of the group and give directions beginning with the words "God says." For example, the director could say, "God says to put your hand over your heart." Children should respond by saying, "I will respond to God," while following the action. However, if the director does not begin a direction with the words "God says," children should respond by doing nothing.

Choose a new director after every three or four directions so each child has a chance to direct. Don't have children sit out—even if they follow the directions incorrectly. When everyone has had a chance to be the director, gather the children.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did you know when to respond to the directions in this game?
- How is that like listening for God's direction in real life?

Say: Just as you listened for the words "God says" in our game, you can listen for God's voice and direction in real life. You can read your Bible, listen to your parents, and pray. God wants us to follow his directions because he always knows what's best for us. Let's make something that will help us remember to listen to God's direction.

I Will Answer

What You'll Do

Have kids turn to the "I Will Answer" section of their My Bible Fun pages. Give each child one empty cardboard tube, a chenille wire, scissors, and glue. Instruct children to cut the phone faces from their My Bible Fun pages and set them aside. Then have

children glue the phone faces on the tubes. Let children use markers to decorate the rest of their phones. Finally, show kids how to fold their chenille wires in half and twist them together from top to bottom. Help children glue their chenille wires into the tops of the tubes to create antennas for the cordless phones. As children work, play "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 4 on the CD).

When children have finished, gather everyone in a circle with the phones they made.

Ask:

■ How do people respond when a phone rings?

Say: People usually answer their phones right away.

Ask:

■ How can this phone be a reminder of how we should respond to God?

Say: We should respond to God as Samuel did—right away! ► GOD WANTS US TO LISTEN AND FOLLOW WHEN HE DIRECTS US.

Say: Let's think about how **GOD WANTS US TO LISTEN AND FOLLOW WHEN HE DIRECTS US.**
