

People Build a Tower at Babel

Genesis 11:1-9

ifth- and sixth-graders have a growing need for independence and doing things on their own. While independence is a vital characteristic in kids' development, it's important to remind kids that we can invite God into all of life's details. Use this lesson to show kids that they can still be independent while putting God first.

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Genesis 11:1-9



People Turn Away From God Again

The pattern continues. Just a few generations and likely only 100 to 200 years after the miraculous saving of Noah's family in the ark, the descendants of those ark dwellers turned away from God. After Noah came out of the ark, one of God's commands to him was to "fill the earth" (Genesis 9:1). It appears that God wanted people to spread out across the earth, but some people decided to group together in a city, making a name for themselves and keeping themselves from being scattered. They showed no concern for glorifying or obeying God. And Noah lived to see all of this happen—Genesis 9:28 tells us that Noah lived 350 years after the Flood!

The people's intent in building a tower was not to reach heaven, as some have suggested, but to build something showy that would bring them recognition. People from all around would see the tall tower that seemed to reach into the heavens. Others would marvel at what they had done, and the builders would be proud. In essence, they tried to make themselves look more important than God.

The Tower Was Just the Beginning

If these people were able to do such a self-serving, God-defying thing as to build this tower, what other evil things were next on the horizon? How long would it be before none were left who honored God? Out of concern for keeping people from further evil, God put a stop to what was happening by causing people to speak different languages.

God's Still in Charge

It's interesting to think about how God might have used this incident to differentiate various races.

By selectively giving certain individuals the same language, God could have directed which people clustered together, and their gene pools could have resulted in races with very different physical characteristics, such as exist today.

Some ancient reports indicate that an unfinished tower stood—perhaps for centuries—just outside the city of Babylon. God took something that evil people intended as a monument to themselves and turned it into a monument to his power and sovereignty. God wants us all to remember what he's done for us and how much we need him!

The Jesus Connection

In all our decisions and experiences, we need God. God meets our needs through Jesus, who fulfills our greatest needs for mercy, love, and eternal life. Jesus is our everything!

Help Needed

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Without saying a word, place a long folding table on the floor, away from chairs or other objects. Say: I'll give a prize to the person who can lift this table off the floor and hold it for five seconds. It's not nailed or glued or filled with iron or anything, but it's still hard to lift. And you can use two hands.

When your first willing child steps forward, ask if anyone else would like to try, too. Line up your lifters with great enthusiasm and applause. Say: **The rest of you will be the cheering team to encourage our lifters.** Before your first lifter attempts to pick up the table, say: **As I said, you can use two hands. But you can hold only the** *end* **of the table.** Point to one end of the table. **Please get in position, and let's see what you can do.**

Unless one of your kids has a promising future as an Olympic weight lifter, you won't see anyone get the table completely off the floor. After going through your lineup of lifters, have everyone sit down.

Ask:

■ What do you think limited the lifters' ability to lift the table completely off of the floor?

Say: What would you do if I changed the rules a bit? If I said there would be a prize for anyone who can figure out how to lift this table, still holding it only by the ends, could you figure out a way to do it?

If no one comes up with the solution (which is for two people to lift, each person grasping an end of the table), invite a willing child to help as you show how it's done. Thank kids for being such good sports, and have kids clean their hands. Then give everyone a snack reward.

As kids are enjoying their snacks, ask them to form pairs. Then distribute this week's Bible Buzz page and pens. Say: There are a lot of jobs in life that you simply can't do by yourself. Sometimes the job requires help! With your partner, come up with situations that require two or more people to get the job done. Draw those ideas in the "Goin' It Alone" box on your Bible Buzz page. You'll have five minutes. Allow time.



Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about the situations you drew that require more than one person to accomplish the task.
- Why can't one person do those tasks by themselves?
- What's satisfying about being able to do something on your own?
- What problems can be caused when a person thinks he or she can do everything without any help from anyone?
- What's reassuring about having someone's help when you can't do something on your own?

Say: Usually it's good to solve problems on our own. But sometimes we rely too much on ourselves and forget that we need God. When ▶ WE PUT GOD FIRST, even in tasks such as the things you drew, our successes are truly successful because we invite God to be a part of them. Today we'll learn about people in the Bible who found a way to do a job—but they did it apart from God. Things didn't turn out well for them. Let's find out why.



EXPLORATION

Tower of Babel Drama Trauma

What You'll Do

Announce that it's time for the Construction Crew Drama Team to swing into action. Assign the following parts to kids:

- Nick, the General Manager
- Construction Workers (two or more kids)
- Bricks (as many kids as you like)
- City Inspector
- Wrecking Ball

Position the General Manager and the Construction Workers at one end of the room. Ask the Bricks to get on their hands and knees nearby. Place the Wrecking Ball at the other end of the room.

Without allowing others to hear, tell the Wrecking Ball child or children that under no circumstances are they to actually touch another child. When called on to knock over the Bricks, the Wrecking Ball can rush toward them, but not actually hit them.

Say: Because you're such great actors, we won't actually practice this drama. We'll just do it. When you hear your part described, simply act out the story. Ready?

Play "Lotsabrick Tower" (track 12 on the CD), and encourage kids to participate by acting out their roles. Remember that the goal is to have everyone involved. After the CD track is finished, gather kids in a circle.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was it like to do all that work only to have it destroyed?
- What could Nick have done to prevent this situation?
- Tell about a time you've had to start over on a project.

Say: People have been building great buildings for years. Show kids the "Seven Wonders of the Ancient World" poster. Do any of you recognize the buildings on this poster? If you do, tell about it. Allow time.

These ancient buildings were all built to praise gods or honor people. Let's play a game as we hear about people in the Bible who built an incredible building to honor themselves. As you listen and play, remember this poster and our drama.

Towering Pride

What You'll Do

Have kids sit in a circle, and read aloud Genesis 11:1-4. Show kids the Bible Timeline, and point to the picture of the Tower of Babel.

Distribute toothpicks and modeling clay. Say: You're going to work together to build a tower, too. For our game, your goal is to build the biggest tower you can as fast as you can to show what amazing builders you are. Work together, and make sure your tower doesn't come tumbling down. Ready? Go! Play "Tower Race" (track 13 on the CD) as kids build.

After the track plays, say: **FREEZE!** Read aloud Genesis 11:5-7 as you walk near the tower as if you're inspecting it. **Now, try to add to your tower while you're speaking gibberish and see if you can communicate your plans. You can only speak in gibberish or not at all.** Allow kids to try for 30 seconds.

Stop your building. Read aloud Genesis 11:8-9. Now spread out in the room until you're out of reach of each other and the tower. Pause. Can you continue to build your tower now? Have kids come together again and sit in a circle.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What dangers would people face in thinking they could do anything all on their own?

- Why do you think asking God to be involved helps keep us from trying to do things that are harmful or focused on ourselves?
- What's fair or unfair about the way God confused the people of Babel's speech to remind them they needed God?
- What made our game similar to what the people of Babel did?
- What can you do to put God first in your actions and goals?

Say: The people who built the tower of Babel felt they could be successful by themselves. They definitely weren't thinking "▶ WE PUT GOD FIRST." They put themselves and their goals first. Let's explore how we can do things differently and be successful with God's help.

What You'll Do

Have kids find the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 6:5, on their Bible Buzz page, and invite a willing child to read aloud: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength."

Say: Our Key Verse gives us the instructions for how to put God first. When we live this way, we won't forget we need God and can avoid the mess the people of Babel made for themselves.

Set out colored pencils, and give each child a "Heart" handout: Say: With the colored pencils, try to color in this entire heart in the time I give you—no white should be showing! You'll have to put a lot of effort into it to succeed. Ready? Go! Allow 30 seconds; then tell kids to stop.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What about filling in the heart drawing in 30 seconds reminds you of what it's like to do something with all your heart—to give it 100 percent of your effort?
- What do you think it means to love God with all your heart? all your soul? all your strength?
- What might it look like to apply the Key Verse to things such as school, sports, what you do at home, and other things in your life?
- Why do you think putting God first in all we do will help make us successful?

Say: God defines success differently than the world defines success. Without God, even our successes are failures. That's what the people of Babel learned the hard

Count the Cost Supplies

Bible Buzz CD player pens **Teacher Pack** CD: "Thinking Hard, Part 1" (track 14), "Thinking Hard, Part 2" (track 15) way. Their incredible tower meant nothing without God. When ▶ WE PUT GOD FIRST and invite God into what we do, we'll be successful in God's eyes. That's the biggest success we could ever hope for! Let's think of things you can invite God into as you grow and get older.

Count the Cost

What You'll Do

Have kids find the "Count the Cost" section on their Bible Buzz page, and make sure everyone has a pen.

Say: In this activity, you'll make a plan for inviting God into what you want to do throughout your life. Think about your life goals, the things you want to eventually achieve before you die. Between now and then, you'll have time to grow up and do some great things.

The question I have for you is this: What great things will you do? In the left column of this page, please write down things you think you might like to do or accomplish; things such as climbing Mount Everest, swimming in an ocean, flying in a plane, being a doctor, anything you hope to do or be. Fill in as many things as you can think of that you'd like to do or accomplish. You've got two minutes to jot down some ideas. While kids work, play "Thinking Hard, Part 1" (track 14 on the CD).

Now in the right column, write ways you can invite God into the goals for your life and into what you think you need to do to achieve them. You'll have another two minutes. Play "Thinking Hard, Part 2" (track 15 on the CD). Then invite willing kids to share one thing from their lists and how they plan to include God.

Say: You've picked some great things to do or become! And I'll bet each of you will accomplish at least some of those dreams as you put God first in what you do.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What excites you most about the things you'd like to do in your life?
- Why do you need God in the plans you wrote down?

Say: Building the tower of Babel would've been a magnificent accomplishment. But it's not standing today—it never got finished. The people forgot to put God first and because of that, all their planning and hard work didn't mean much or last. When

WE PUT GOD FIRST, we'll have success simply because God is with us in what we do. God can guide us in making our dreams come true or direct us to a new dream that's even better than we could've imagined. Let's decide on ways we can practice putting God first this week.





Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about simple strategies we can use this week as ▶ WE PUT GOD FIRST.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz page and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- When you wake up, talk to God about your plans for the day and invite God to guide you in what you do.
- Before you make a choice, pray about it and ask God what to do.
- Before you start an activity with friends or watch your favorite TV show, spend time reading your Bible—God's Word.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Talk With Kids

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas. Allow time.

Say: The tower of Babel builders tried to do things for their own credit. Let's live differently. We'll gain valuable practice and remember that ▶ WE PUT GOD FIRST as we follow through on our Daily Challenges this week.

Weaving Faith at Home

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about putting God first. Kids can also do the activities in the "HomeConnect" section of their Bible Buzz pages with their families.

Ask kids to hold their Bible Buzz page as they form a prayer circle with you. Have kids each pick their favorite of the dreams listed on their Bible Buzz page. Then invite kids to say that dream when prompted in the following prayer.

Pray: God, thank you for our lives and everything we'll have the chance to do as we get older. We're very excited about these goals: (have children say the goal they picked from their Bible Buzz page). Please help us remember to invite you into the steps we take to make our dreams come true and help us to honor you in all we do. In Jesus' name, amen.
