# **Abram Follows God's Direction**

Genesis 12:1-8

ifth- and sixth-graders' growing knowledge of and concern for the world—and its unfairness—can call into question their belief in God's trustworthiness. Their logical-thinking ability is growing, and preteens will have challenging faith questions. Take those as opportunities to discover new things about God, and they'll see they can do the same. Questions about faith don't necessarily mean giving up on faith. Use this lesson to spark important discussions and guide kids to understanding that we can always trust God.

# **Abram Follows God's Direction**

Genesis 12:1-8



### Abram Obeys God's Command to Move

"Sell everything you can't carry, leave your friends and extended family, bring your wife and belongings. You'll probably never come back here again, but don't worry about that—I'll show you where to go." This was essentially God's command for Abram.

What trust in God it took for Abram to leave his home and everything familiar, and set out for an unknown destination, having only God's command to go on! Abram also had the worries of keeping intact the things he took with him. In those days, traveling with herds of livestock through unknown territory was treacherous. Besides, Abram was 75 years old! But he trusted and followed God.

## **Abram's Traveling Companions**

What helped Abram on his way was a trusting relationship with God and the promises of blessing that would benefit not only his household but "all the peoples on earth"!

Lot, Abram's nephew, went along but probably not just for companionship or adventure. It was a disgrace in that culture to not have descendants, and Abram realized that he and his wife were getting too old to have children. Abram may have asked Lot to go because Abram had no offspring of his own to take charge if Abram died or became incapacitated.

We're told nothing about the journey, but the trip from Haran to Bethel was approximately 400 miles, much of it over rough desert land. Conflict with local residents was likely a daily occurrence, and the trip probably took a month or more.

## **God Blesses Abram for Obeying**

Abram completed the journey in faith, and then, as described in Genesis 12:7, the Lord appeared to him. God had spoken to Abram earlier, but now God appeared and confirmed the promise he had made to Abram back at Haran: The fertile land before him would one day belong to his descendants. That meant the promises were beginning to come true!

Abram built an altar to honor God through worship. "Calling upon the name of the Lord" meant worshipping him and acknowledging him as God. Abram knew that God had blessed him already and that many more blessings were still to come.

#### The Jesus Connection

Jesus taught us how to trust in God and proved that God won't let us down. May Jesus' example inspire you to have the courage to trust as Abram did!

Think about an experience that challenged you to trust God. If you knew then what you know now, how would your trust level have been different? With that in mind, pray for each of the individuals in your ministry, asking God to strengthen and inspire them all to trust him. You can write your prayer here.

# **Ballooning Trust**

#### What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went. Then have kids form pairs. Give each pair a marker and each child a balloon.

Say: With the marker, take turns carefully writing on the balloon the name of something you value most, such as an electronic device, a book, a photo—whatever you value most. Allow one minute. Now, blow your balloon up and exchange it with your partner. Tell about the thing you wrote on your balloon and why it's one of your most valued possessions. Help kids that may need assistance in blowing up or tying off their balloons.

Throughout our time here today, you'll care for and not break or lose your partner's balloon because it represents something very important to him or her.

To start our lesson, let's form a circle and play a quick game. Remember as we play that you need to keep track of your partner's balloon. The goal of our game is to keep all the balloons in the air without breaking away from our circle. You can't move your feet. Try to keep the balloons moving in the air and in the circle. You'll have two minutes to try. If any balloons fall out of the circle, leave them there and keep the remaining balloons in the air. Any questions? Answer any questions about the directions. Ready? Go! Allow time.

Freeze! Great job playing the game, but does anybody know where your partner's balloon is? Allow responses. Find your partner's balloon, and then let's all sit in a circle with the balloons.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

#### Ask:

- What about our game distracted you from your original task of taking care of your partner's balloon—a balloon that represents one of his or her most valuable possessions?
- What are things in life that can distract you from being trustworthy?
- What makes it hard to trust others with your most precious things?
- What about a person makes him or her trustworthy?

Say: Trust is an important part of the relationships in our lives, and often the people we trust most are the people we know best. As we get to know God more and more, we'll discover that ▶ WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD. Let's look at the trusting relationship a man named Abram had with God.

# **Marching Orders**

### What You'll Do

Distribute this week's Bible Buzz page. Have kids form pairs and line up, one pair behind the other. Read aloud Genesis 12:1-4. Show kids the Bible Timeline, and have kids find and point to the picture of Abram obeying God.

Say: God asked Abram to move to a new place. It's time to move out just as Abram did, except that we'll move in a military style. Ready?

Start kids marching in place, coordinating their lefts and rights as they march. When everyone is moving together, begin marching slowly around your room. Say: Repeat the following words after me as we march. The words are printed in the "Marching Orders" section on your Bible Buzz pages if you'd like to look there as we march. If not, you can simply repeat after me.

God has asked us to move out. (God has asked us to move out.) We're not sure what it's about! (We're not sure what it's about!) We are trusting in God's plan, (We are trusting in God's plan,) Trusting now the best we can. (Trusting now the best we can.) Sound off! (1-2!) Sound off! (3-4!) Sound off! (1-2-3-4, 1-2...3-4!)

Abram and his nephew Lot (Abram and his nephew Lot)
Took the things that they had bought, (Took the things that they had bought,)
Took their families and their flocks, (Took their families and their flocks,)
Walked across the sand and rocks. (Walked across the sand and rocks.)
Sound off! (1-2!)
Sound off! (3-4!)
Sound off! (1-2-3-4, 1-2...3-4!)

Got no directions, got no map, (Got no directions, got no map,)
Got no place to take a nap. (Got no place to take a nap.)
But God will take us by the hand (But God will take us by the hand)
And lead us to the Promised Land. (And lead us to the Promised Land.)
Sound off! (1-2!)
Sound off! (3-4!)
Sound off! (1-2-3-4, 1-2...3-4!)

When you've finished the march, have kids sit in a circle.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

#### Ask:

- What was it like marching around following directions?
- When you follow someone's directions, what does that do to show you trust that person?

Say: Abram knew WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD, so he followed God's directions to leave his home behind. Let's find out more of what Abram did.

# Journey of Abram

#### What You'll Do

Invite a willing child to read aloud Genesis 12:5-8.

Say: We're going to go on a little journey following the route on a map of Abram's journey. Show kids "The Journey of Abram" poster, and invite a willing child to be the Navigator to lead the rest of the group around the room looking for signs that match the stops read about in the verses. Help kids find the starting place at Haran, if needed. At the Shechem stop, invite a willing child to again read aloud verses 6-7. Then say: You can work together to build an altar here at our Shechem stop using the Bibles. Repeat this sequence at the Bethel stop with verse 8.

Ask: What things help you to trust God?

Distribute a pen and several sticky notes to each child. Have kids sit on the floor around "The Journey of Abram" poster and write on sticky notes reasons they trust God. Allow two minutes. Say: **Now you can stack your notes on the poster as an altar of the reasons you trust God.** Allow time.

Say: Abram built altars to offer sacrifices and to create a visible reminder that God had done something at a certain place. Abram trusted God to keep a promise, and God did just that.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

#### Ask:

- In what ways did you have to trust the Navigator to lead you to the right place?
- How was that like or unlike how Abram trusted God on his journey?
- Tell about a time you trusted God even though you were confused, scared, or uncertain.
- What did you do to show God your trust in that situation?



Say: Abram trusted God even when Abram didn't know where he was going or what was coming next. ► WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD, too. God may not ask us to travel a long way from home, but we'll go through times that are difficult. The best way to get through those tough situations is to trust God, because God knows what's best in our lives. Knowing how to trust God can be hard, though. Let's find out what it takes to trust God, and then we'll commit to trusting God in our lives.

# **Straight Path**

#### What You'll Do

Make sure everyone has a Bible, and then help kids find the Key Verse, Proverbs 3:5-6. Invite a willing child to read the Key Verse aloud: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight."

#### Ask:

God promises to make our paths straight. What do you think that means?

Say: Let's explore what it looks like to trust God and how that impacts our actions. Distribute pencils and sheets of paper. You have five seconds to draw a perfectly straight line on your paper without any help. Go! Allow time. If kids try to use a straight edge to trace a straight line, remind them that they can't have any help.

Time's up! Raise your hand if you think you have a perfectly straight line.

Take a ruler or other piece of paper to any child who claims to have drawn a perfectly straight line, and check out the results. It may be close, but you won't find a perfect line.

Let's try again with the help of something to guide us.

Show kids how to use the edge of a ruler or Bible as a guide to draw a straight line.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

#### Ask:

- What did a straight edge, such as the edge of a Bible, do to guide you?
- In what ways can reading the Bible help us stay on the path God wants us on and keep our path in life straight?
- How does that remind you of the way God makes our paths straight when we trust him to guide us?

# 82-Second Countdown Supplies

Bible Buzz cellphone timer or watch Say: It was impossible to make the path you drew on your paper perfectly straight without the help of something else. God promises to guide us and make our paths straight if we'll trust and lean on God. Abram trusted God to keep that promise, and God showed Abram which paths to take. Like Abram, ▶ WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD. Let's do a challenge to learn more about trust.

## 82-Second Countdown

### What You'll Do

Say: In this challenge, I want you to keep your eyes closed until I tell you to open them. Close your eyes now. While your eyes are closed, I promise I won't take a squirt bottle out and squirt you with ice-cold water. Really. You can trust me.

Pause and make a few noises so it sounds as if you could be pulling out a squirt bottle. Ask kids to open their eyes.

#### Ask:

What made you keep or lose trust in me when I mentioned the squirt bottle?

Allow responses; then say: Close your eyes again.

Now we'll put a twist on the challenge. I'm going to ask you to raise your right hand when you think 82 seconds have passed. I'll keep an eye on a clock so I'll know exactly when 82 seconds have passed. You keep your eyes closed, and don't look at any watch or clock. Raise your hands silently when you think the time has passed. Keep your eyes closed until I tell you to open them. Ready? Begin now.

Keep track of which kids guess closest to 82 seconds when they raise their hands. Create confusion by rambling on about anything that involves lots of numbers.

When 60 seconds have passed, say: In just a few seconds, it'll be time. If you think you can trust me, raise your hands when I tell you. If you don't trust me, raise them when you want to raise them.

At precisely 82 seconds, say: Now.

See who raises their hands. Make sure kids keep their eyes closed until all hands are raised. When all hands are raised, ask kids to open their eyes. Announce who was closest in his or her estimate, pointing out that you really were honest about what you told them—they simply needed to trust you.

#### Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

#### Ask:

Why did you choose to trust or not trust me?

- What made it easier or harder to trust me the second time? Explain.
- Why did the situation make a difference in whether you chose to trust me or not?
- What has God done for you to prove you can trust him?
- What can you do to trust God no matter the situation?

Say: People may disappoint us, by accident or on purpose. But no matter how confused we are or how uncomfortable we feel, ▶ WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD. Abram trusted God through many unknowns. It's not easy to keep going when you don't know what's next. But Abram chose to trust God no matter what difficulties or uncertainties he faced on his journey. Let's talk about ways we can do that this week.

# **Daily Challenges**

#### What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about how **WE CAN ALWAYS TRUST GOD** no matter what happens this week.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz page and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- Tell God about a struggle you're having, and ask God to guide you on the path to a solution.
- Ask God to help you try something new that you'd be afraid to try on your own.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.




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
