

Philip Tells the Ethiopian About Jesus Acts 8:26-40

W hile most fifth- and sixth-graders aren't in a position to make big life decisions, they're often making decisions that feel big to them. They're asking, "Why would we want God to lead us?" Use this lesson to teach preteens that even though they might not know where he's leading them, they can trust God to lead them to the perfect place. He is holy, and wholly trustworthy.

Philip Tells the Ethiopian About Jesus

Acts 8:26-40

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Philip Obeyed God's Leading

According to Acts 8:4-8, Philip was preaching Christ, healing people, and bringing great joy to a Samaritan city. But God had another plan for Philip, which included guiding the first non-Jewish convert to faith in Jesus and God's plan resulted in Christianity being taken to Ethiopia. Philip responded in obedience.

Since the Ethiopian eunuch had gone to Jerusalem to worship, we can assume he knew something of the Jewish faith. He may have been fully committed to the faith because he had traveled quite a distance to worship, perhaps as far as 200 miles! He had likely been inspired by his time of worship, because he was reading from Isaiah as he rode along. We might find it strange that Philip could hear what he was reading, but it was common in ancient times to read aloud. In fact, the language was such that sounding out the words was almost necessary.

Philip Was Prepared for Questions

At the Holy Spirit's prompting, Philip overcame not only any fears or questions about non-Jews becoming Christians, but also any racial prejudice he may have had. The Ethiopian was a native of what is now northern Sudan and was black-skinned. God is not concerned with the color of our skin, and neither was Philip.

Philip had no difficulty answering the Ethiopian's questions. He had probably been answering the same types of questions from the Samaritans. God had prepared the right person to present the gospel to the Ethiopian on the road.

When Philip told the man about Jesus, the Ethiopian apparently expressed belief immediately. Baptism was taken very seriously in the early church. Philip must have been fully convinced of the certainty and sincerity of the Ethiopian's belief, because he consented to baptize this traveler.

The Jesus Connection

Having completed his task, Philip was again sent on his way by God. The text seems to indicate that God miraculously swept him away, on to his next mission. The Ethiopian continued on his way, and tradition tells us that he spread the message of Christ in Ethiopia, soon baptizing the queen and others there.

We often don't know why God guides us to do certain things. But when we know what God wants us to do, we must respond in faith and action. Who knows what God will do through us if we respond faithfully to the guidance of his Holy Spirit?

Deconstructing Instructions

What You'll Do

Distribute this week's Bible Buzz pages and pens, and have kids find the "Can You Follow Instructions?" section.

Say: Read and follow the instructions for this activity. Do this activity on your own and without talking to your neighbor.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What are some things in life that remind you of these instructions?
- Tell about a time you didn't follow instructions. What happened?

Say: It's easy not to follow directions well. In this activity it wasn't a big deal if you messed up. But that's not always the case. It is a big deal for us to ▶ FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS. Let's examine a time God gave some very important directions to Philip.

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Philip's Instructions

What You'll Do

Have kids get into trios—they should remain in their trios for this experience, even though they won't do anything specifically in trios until close to the end. Make sure each group has a Bible, and direct kids to walk to Instruction Station 1.

Instruction Station 1

Ask:

- What are some directions that different people give you?
- How often do you obey those directions?

Say: Let's read about some instructions Philip got-directly from an angel!

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Have kids open their Bibles to Acts 8:26, and ask a willing child to read the verse aloud.

Say: Well, the angel told Philip to head south to the desert road, so let's go ahead and walk along the desert road ourselves. Then we'll see how well Philip followed directions.

Have kids follow you as you walk them around the room, down the hall, or even outside. Encourage them to pretend they're walking on a desert road. They could act like they're very thirsty or weak from the heat, or walk as if the road is hot from the sun. When you've walked a little, come back to Instruction Station 1.

Ask:

- What were you thinking as you were following me?
- Why did you follow me?

Say: When someone we trust gives us directions or leads us, we usually follow willingly. That's what Philip did here. God gave him some directions, and right away he followed!

Have kids get back into their trios, and have each trio read Acts 8:27-29.

Say: Philip knew that he needed to ► FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS. Each time God gave Philip directions, he followed right away! I have another set of directions for you to follow so we can find out what happens next. Two of the people in each trio will make a chariot to carry the third person to the next Instruction Station.

Have two kids each place their right hand on the upper forearm of their left arm and then grab the right forearm of the other person to create a "chair." Ask the third member of each trio to sit on the "chair." Direct the "chariots" to carefully carry "Philip" to Instruction Station 2 to find out what happens with Philip next.







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Instruction Station 2

When the "chariots" arrive at the station, ask kids to sit in their trios. Have the kids who rode on the chariots read Acts 8:30-35 aloud in their trios.

Have trios discuss these questions:

Ask:

- When have you had a hard time understanding something you were reading?
- How has someone helped you understand what you were reading?
- How did Philip help the Ethiopian understand what he was reading?
- Why was it important for Philip to go to the Ethiopian?

Say: So far Philip has followed where God has led, but there's more! He goes a step further in following God's directions. To find out what happens next, we need to move to Instruction Station 3. But first, let's take off our shoes and socks because the next part takes place in the water.

Have kids remove their shoes and socks and hold on to them as they walk to Instruction Station 3. Make sure kids take their Bibles with them.

Instruction Station 3

As you arrive at the station, have kids remain standing in their trios. Ask a willing preteen in each trio to read aloud Acts 8:36-40. As they read, use the spray bottle to spray each child's feet. When everyone has been sprayed and trios have finished reading, continue.

Say: Since we don't really have a body of water here, we'll just pretend we're walking in water.

Ask:

- What does it say about the Ethiopian's trust that he asked Philip to baptize him on the spot?
- Why do you think the Holy Spirit took Philip away after he baptized the Ethiopian?

Say: Philip followed God's directions to help the Ethiopian find a true relationship with God. That's a great way to ► FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS.

Ask:

- How did Philip's obedience affect the Ethiopian?
- Do you believe God has instructions for you, too? Why or why not?
- How can we know what God wants us to do?

Say: Philip was focusing on God when he received his instructions, so it was easy for him to follow where God led him. He knew God's voice and followed every directive down to the last letter. Sometimes the way we respond to God's leading depends on how well we pay attention. Let's talk more about how we can ► FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS in our lives.

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What Did I Draw?

What You'll Do

Have kids form pairs. Have pairs determine who will be a One and who will be a Two. Have Ones sit in the chairs closest to the wall and Twos sit in the chairs facing away from the wall. If you have an extra preteen, have him or her sit in an extra chair as an additional Two. Give Twos each a pen, and have them find the "Can You Draw What I See?" section.

Say: I'm going to draw a shape on the board. Ones will be able to look at what I'm drawing, and they'll try to explain to their Twos partners how to draw it without naming the item they're drawing. Only Ones can look at my drawing. They may also look at their partner's drawing. Ones may only tell Twos what to draw; they can't touch or change Twos' drawings.





Draw one of the shapes shown for the Ones to walk the Twos through.

Give a signal to begin. Monitor the Twos to make sure they don't peek. If someone does, use that as a teachable moment when you debrief the activity. After Twos have completed their attempts at the drawing, have partners switch roles, and repeat the activity with the other preteen drawing the second object. When everyone has attempted a drawing, have kids share their creations with each other.

Have kids find the Key Verse, Proverbs 3:5-6, on their Bible Buzz pages. Have the Twos read the verse to the Ones: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight" (Proverbs 3:5-6).

Say: Let's sing a song to help us remember this verse. Distribute copies of the lyrics, and lead kids in singing "Trust in the Lord" (Proverbs 3:5-6) (track 14 on the CD).

(Chorus)

Trust in the Lord (trust in the Lord) With all your heart (with all your heart), And lean not on your own understanding (understanding). In all your ways (in all your ways), Acknowledge him (acknowledge him); He will make your paths straight.

What Did I Draw? Easy Prep

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made this activity difficult?
- What did this activity have to do with trust?
- If someone peeked, ask: For those of you who peeked, what does that say about your level of trust with your partner?
- In your life, when is it tempting to rely on your own understanding?
- How was following your partner's directions like or unlike following God's directions?
- Why is it important to follow where God leads?

Say: It's so easy for us to want to rely on our own understanding and follow our own paths. But this verse helps us see that it's important to trust God with our lives and FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS. Philip did that, and it changed the Ethiopian's life forever.

Puzzle Prayer Partners

What You'll Do

Say: God leads us in all sorts of ways, and yet in our daily lives, the ways God does this can be a bit puzzling. To understand this better, I have a puzzle for you to put together. There are two puzzles, each with 14 pieces that include matching pairs.

Keep the "God" pieces for yourself, and hand out one piece of the "God's Leading" puzzles to each preteen. If you have extras, give some preteens two, but avoid giving matching pieces to anyone.

Say: Your job is to find the person who has the other half of your matching pair. When you have found him or her, pair up and place your two matched pieces on

the table. As pairs come to the table with their matched pieces, determine how to put each of the two puzzles together. Ready? Go!

Allow kids to work on the puzzles. After they get all of the pieces together except for the pieces you have, gather them around the puzzles. Then bring out the last pieces and put them in place in the puzzles.

Say: These puzzles show us some ways God leads us.

Remove the center "God" pieces, and point to the puzzles.

Say: But the important thing to remember is that all these ways that God leads us make our lives an unfinished puzzle if we don't put God into the center.

Replace the "God" pieces into the center of the puzzles.

Say: With God's leading, our lives aren't a puzzle. We may not fully understand how God is leading us in certain situations, but we can be sure he's still leading us.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- How is life like a puzzle?
- How does following God's leading make life less like a puzzle?
- What's one way you feel God leading you?
- How will you respond to that this week?

Say: God wants to lead you. If you let him, you'll go on grand adventures and know that God is with you every step of the way. Philip listened and obeyed, and we can too. ► FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS you, and you'll never be the same.

ASTING

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about how we can FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS this week.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

Spend time asking God to lead you in the ways he wants. As you pray, make sure you focus entirely on God. 3-6-3-

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- Read God's Word to see how he's leading you. This will help you focus on him as Philip did. You can start with Matthew 28:19-20. But don't stop there! There's so much more you can learn about following God.
- Talk to a trusted Christian adult about how he or she focuses on and follows God.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell the kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, place, and other ideas.

Say: Philip didn't know exactly what would come of his conversation with the Ethiopian, but he knew if he would just ► FOLLOW WHERE GOD LEADS, he'd be okay. Let's follow God this week by following through on our Daily Challenges.
