

Apostles Defend Their Faith

Acts 5:12-42

Y our fifth- and sixth-graders value both fitting in and standing out. They want to be accepted by peers, but not ignored or unrecognized. They're looking for ways to be the best or the brightest—to get attention for something. Use that desire for distinction as a motivation for kids to stand firm in their faith. Share stories about how you've run into conflict and what you did to get through it.

Apostles Defend Their Faith

Acts 5:12-42

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The Jailed Apostles, Miraculously Freed, Return to the Temple

As described in Acts 4, Peter and John had been brought before the Sanhedrin for questioning and told to stop teaching in the name of Jesus. Frustrated but finding no reason to punish them, the Sanhedrin had to let them go. Now, after performing more miraculous signs and arousing more excitement among the people, all of the apostles were brought in and locked up overnight. The Sanhedrin likely intended to punish them the next day. However, the next morning, the doors and gates to the cell were still securely locked, but the prisoners were gone. Rather than accept the supernatural release of the apostles, the authorities apparently concluded that someone in the Temple police was a sympathizer and had freed the prisoners.

When the apostles were approached in the Temple court again, no force was used to bring them back to the meeting of the Sanhedrin. Had the apostles wanted to resist, the support of the crowd would have made it difficult for the religious leaders to bring them in. But the apostles didn't resist. Notice that the high priest didn't even want to utter the name of Jesus. Perhaps the high priest was afraid that the apostles would make him and the Sanhedrin look guilty for the death of Jesus. His guilt was haunting him, and he was becoming paranoid about the disciples' motives.

Gamaliel Advises the Sanhedrin to Let the Apostles Go

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Peter, responding for all the apostles, was very clear. Members of the Sanhedrin couldn't disagree with the principle; they just disagreed over what it meant to obey God. Mistaken as they were, they thought they were obeying God.

Gamaliel's response to the Sanhedrin was wise. After reminding the Sanhedrin of two people who had commanded followings and later faded away, he advised the Sanhedrin to leave the apostles alone. He said that if what the apostles were doing was simply self-manufactured it would go nowhere, but if it was of God, even the Sanhedrin wouldn't be able to stop it.

The Jesus Connection

The Holy Spirit is sometimes described as a "deposit" assuring that God will make good on his promises of what is yet to come. The Holy Spirit guides, convicts, and inspires us as we grow in our relationship with Jesus.

God has given his own Spirit to live in you, making you alive, animating your soul, giving you his very essence. Pray that God will help you feel fully alive. You can write your prayer here.

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Take a Stand

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went. After everyone has arrived, have kids line up single file on the line and stand at attention, one in front of the other. Explain that they'll be asked to respond to a dozen statements. If they agree, they're to take one step to the right. If they disagree, they're to take one step to the left. Tell kids that they must step off the line in response to each statement, and they can't change the statements or their responses.

When kids are in position, play "Left or Right" (track 12 on the CD). Each statement is separated by five seconds of silence. Pause the CD if you need more time between any statements.

After the CD's final statement, "Rich people are usually smarter than poor people," ask kids to form trios and discuss the following questions.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did it feel to take a stand on so many issues?
- How did it feel to see a friend take a stand that was different from yours?
- Would you quit being friends with someone who disagreed with you? Why or why not?
- What if you would have been beaten up for agreeing or disagreeing with any of the issues just mentioned? Would you have still taken the stand? Why or why not?

Say: It's tough to take a stand when someone you like—who you also want to like you—is on the other side of the issue. If you're living as a Christian in an unchristian world, you'll run into this often. The question to answer is, How can we ► KEEP FOLLOWING GOD, EVEN WHEN IT'S HARD?





Instant Drama Department

What You'll Do

Say: When Jesus returned to heaven, he appointed special followers to carry on the work he began. Jesus called these men apostles because they were witnesses of Jesus' ministry on earth. The apostles performed miracles of healing, taught people about Jesus, and got some religious leaders very upset. Let's explore these events by performing our not-quite-yet-famous instant drama!

After I assign your roles, I'll read the Bible story as the narrator, and you simply act out what you hear as the story unfolds.

Assign the following key roles: Peter, the crowd, a sick person, the high priest, a jail guard, the Sanhedrin, and Gamaliel. Remaining students could role-play additional apostles, people in the crowd, or members of the Sanhedrin.

Distribute costumes and have kids move to their areas of the "stage." Then read the story from Acts 5:12-42, pausing to allow kids to mime the motions. After the drama, lead a round of rousing applause. Then have students discuss the following questions.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think it would've been like to experience what the apostles did?
- Do you think you could have acted the way they did? Why or why not?
- How do you think the apostles would answer the question "What should we do when it's hard to be a Christian?"

Say: The apostles and other followers of Jesus did suffer many times for their faith, but they kept following God, even when it got hard. Let's look into this more.

Persecuted People

What You'll Do

Have students find the "Hard Times" section in Bible Buzz. Form groups of three or four, and assign each group one of the four boxes in the "Hard Times" section. Distribute pens and Bibles. Have groups choose someone to be the reader, another person to record the group's answers, another to report the group's findings, and a fourth person to encourage everyone's involvement and help the group stay on task.

Persecuted People Easy Prep

Tear out the Lesson 6 pages from each Bible Buzz student book.

Say: Each group will read about times the apostles or other leaders were persecuted or punished for their beliefs. Some groups will explore in more detail the story we just acted out, and the rest of the groups will explore other stories. Take about 10 minutes and complete your group's assigned section.

Allow about 10 minutes for kids to work. Give two- and one-minute warnings. When groups have finished, ask each group's reporter to share his or her group's findings with the class. Have students record the information shared for each story in the Bible Buzz.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- How were the stories that we shared similar? different?
- Based on these stories, how would you define persecution?
- When you face persecution, how is it similar to what the apostles and others faced? How is it different?
- What should you do when it's hard to be a Christian?

Say: We probably won't face the kind of persecution we've explored in the Bible today. But we can experience persecution in various ways for believing and practicing our faith. The apostles and others looked to God for strength. Let's do that now.

Have students find the "Prayer for the Persecuted" section in Bible Buzz. Have kids find a place to work alone.

Say: Each of you may feel certain ways that you're persecuted. Your friends may tease you, or your school may think that you're a negative example for your beliefs. Take a few minutes to write a personal prayer to God, asking him to give you strength when you face persecution of any kind.

Allow kids a few minutes to write their prayers.

Play "Reflective Music" (track 13 on the CD) while kids write their prayers. After a few minutes, say: Just as you have done, the apostles and others who faced persecution looked to God for strength. Then they started teaching again and living out their faith. You, too, can ► KEEP FOLLOWING GOD, EVEN WHEN IT'S HARD. Let's do that now.

Have students find the Key Verse, James 1:2-3, in Bible Buzz (Lesson 6): "Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance."

Ask:

How can the words of this song help you when it's hard to be a Christian?

Say: We should ► KEEP FOLLOWING GOD, EVEN WHEN IT'S HARD. The verse in James says "to consider it pure joy." That's something the apostles did, even when they were beaten for teaching about Jesus. Let's create banners that show how we feel about Jesus. No matter how others respond to these words, if we truly believe in Jesus, we can't keep quiet about him.

Distribute three-foot lengths of newsprint large enough to be used as a banner. Set out an assortment of broad-tipped markers, and ask kids to make banners that begin with

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"Jesus is..." Explain that they will have five minutes to finish their banners, and then make a banner yourself.

After the students have finished their banners, ask them to follow you outside, where you'll hold up your banners so people can see them as they drive by. Then, on the church lawn or in the parking lot, gather students in a circle. Pray that they would have courage to be faithful when life gets tough. Dedicate your banners to be used for God's glory.

Allow kids to take their banners home, encouraging them to hang their banners in a prominent place inside or outside their houses this week.
