Children who feel safe and secure in having their needs met will eventually understand that God keeps all his promises, too. As you work with little ones, continually emphasize that God always keeps his promises to us.

God Floods the Earth

Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16



God Speaks to Noah—Noah Obeys

Genesis 6 wraps up with Noah obeying "God" (*Elohim*). Chapter 7 begins with "the Lord" (*Yahweh*) speaking to Noah. The use of these two names in these places is noteworthy. The name *Elohim* tends to be used to emphasize God's justice, and the name *Yahweh* most often denotes God's mercy. In Chapter 6, Noah carried out God's orders that showed God's judgment on humankind. In Chapter 7, we see the administration of God's mercy in the salvation of Noah's family and the animals.

The Flood Arrives

When the flood came, it wasn't caused only by rain. We read also that "the springs of the great deep burst forth." Water came shooting upward from under the earth's surface as rain deluged the earth from above. There was so much water that it covered the highest mountains by more than 20 feet! Some scientists believe that this event involved the sliding of continents and the creation of mountain ranges as subterranean plates slid and crashed together.

Noah and His Family Return to Dry Land

Once the rain stopped, it took almost a year for the water to recede sufficiently for Noah and his family to leave the ark. It's interesting that one of the birds Noah had sent out to see if the earth was getting dry returned with an olive leaf. The olive branch has come to symbolize peace. Perhaps in the time of Noah it symbolized a new peace between God and his creation.

Notice that Noah had a method for testing to see if the earth was dry, but God told him when he should leave the ark (Genesis 8:15-17). God was taking care of Noah and his family, just as he had promised.

God Makes a Promise

In Genesis 9:12-16, God again demonstrated his love for Noah. He made another promise, signified by the rainbow. The rainbow will always remind us of God's promise to Noah and the fact that God always keeps his promises!

The Jesus Connection

Everyone—adults included—struggles to keep commitments and promises. As we juggle responsibilities to family, job, spouse, and friends, we often find these commitments conflicting with each other. And to add to the challenge, we live in a world where the character trait of "faithfulness" isn't necessarily valued.

Pray for individuals in your ministry that as they model faithfulness and promise-keeping to others, they also paint a picture of a promise-keeping God. You can write your prayer here.



Rain and Rainbows

What You'll Do

As crawlers are playing on the floor or as you sit on the floor holding an infant, point out the "Big Boat" poster on the wall. Spray a few drops of water on the poster. As babies look at the poster, help them reach out and feel the wetness.

Say: Oooh! It's wet like rain. Lots and lots of rain! God sent rain to float the boat. The boat floated for a long time. Rock the baby from side to side. The animals inside were nice and warm. The Bible tells us God dried the rain. Wipe the poster with a tissue. God made a promise to never send that much rain again. God made a rainbow to remind us of his promise. God keeps all promises. FOD NEVER LIES.



Ribbon Rainbows

What You'll Do

For younger infants, hold the rainbow streamer you made by the center knot, and dangle the streamer in front of the baby's face. Slowly move it from one side to the other. The baby's eyes will follow the streamer. Older infants will enjoy feeling the streamer land on their heads and tickle their cheeks.

Say: See the pretty rainbow? God keeps his promises! ▶ GOD NEVER LIES.

Say this rhyme as you rock or walk with a baby:

God keeps all his promises. He's faithful, kind, and true. Yes, God, he never, ever lies. He'll always comfort you.

Cover the teaching poster with clear plastic wrap (or laminate it). Hang it low on a wall where toddlers can see it.

No More Rain

What You'll Do

Gather a group of toddlers around the "Big Boat" poster. Open your Bible to Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16, and tell children this is God's special book.

Spray water on the poster. As toddlers look at the poster, help them reach out and feel the wetness. Some toddlers may have enough hand strength to spray the water bottle. Let them try, and help as needed.

Say: After Noah built his boat, it rained and rained and rained. No one had ever seen so much water. The boat floated for a long time. Encourage toddlers to rock from side to side. The animals inside Noah's ark were nice and warm. The Bible tells us God dried the rain. Distribute tissues, and let the toddlers wipe the poster dry. God made a promise to never send that much rain again. God made a rainbow to remind us of his promise. Point to the rainbow on the poster. See the pretty colors in the rainbow? They remind us of God's promise to Noah. God kept all his promises to Noah, and he keeps all his promises to us.

GOD NEVER LIES.

Conclude by singing "God Never Lies to Us" (not on the CD) to the tune of "London Bridge":

God, he never lies to us, He tells the truth, tells the truth. God, he never lies to us, How I love him.





Rainbow Colors

What You'll Do

Set out damp paper towels and the prepared copies of the "Rainbow Promises" page. Explain to toddlers that as they rub the damp towel over the rainbow, they'll make even more beautiful colors. Help children rub the colors gently without "scrubbing" their papers. Then let children color the papers with large crayons or washable markers. Encourage them as they work.

Say: All the beautiful colors of the rainbow remind us that God keeps all promises. ► GOD NEVER LIES. What a pretty reminder God gave us!

Raindrops

What You'll Do

Set the dishpan of water, sponges, and spoons in the center of a plastic tablecloth on the floor. Gather a few toddlers around. Show older toddlers how to make "raindrops" by squeezing the sponges over the dishpan. Younger toddlers who aren't able to squeeze the sponges can scoop and pour raindrops with the spoons.

As toddlers make their raindrops, remind them that God promised never to flood the world again. Reinforce that **DOD NEVER LIES.** When you're ready to wrap up the activity, say this rhyme with children:

Rain, rain, go away! Noah's animals want to come out and play.

Rainbows of Promise

What You'll Do

Gather children together near the "Big Boat" poster. Remind children that Noah obeyed God and did what God asked him to do. Open your Bible to Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16, and tell children this is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us God told Noah to put his family and the animals into the ark. God was sending a big rainstorm and wanted to keep Noah's family and the animals safe. Pat your hands on your legs to make rain sounds.

As children are making rain sounds, gently spray water above their heads.

Say: Keep patting your legs because it rained and rained and rained and rained for a very long time. Gently spray some more water. The Bible tells us it rained so much that the waters flooded the earth. Noah, his family, and the animals lived in the ark that floated on top of the water. Let's row that boat together. Encourage the children to make rowing motions with their arms.

After a long time, it stopped raining, and the flood waters went away. Pretty soon the sun came out. Point to the rainbow on the poster. What is this? A rainbow! God put a rainbow in the sky. What colors do you see in the rainbow? God told Noah the rainbow was a sign that he'd never send a flood to destroy the earth again. Every time you see a rainbow, remember that God keeps all promises.

Rainbow Reminders

What You'll Do

Set out large crayons or washable markers and copies of the "Rainbow Promises" page. Have children color the handout.

Say: God made beautiful rainbow colors for us to enjoy. We're going to make rainbows on our papers to remind us that ▶ GOD NEVER LIES.

In the center of each child's paper, place blue, yellow, and red blobs of finger paint.

Show children how to run their fingers over the surface of the plastic wrap to spread the paint into a rainbow. Lift off the plastic wrap, and set the pictures aside to dry.

Rainbow Mosaic

What You'll Do

Give children sheets of colored construction paper. Help children tear the paper into small pieces and then throw the pieces into the air for rain.

Say: Now let's make a rainbow to remind us that God stopped the rain. God keeps all promises because God loves us. ▶ GOD NEVER LIES.

Have children pick up the pieces of paper and place them on the sticky vinyl adhesive paper to make a rainbow. As children place the colors, sing "Rainbow Maker" (not on the CD) to the tune of "Did You Ever See a Lassie?"

Y our child learned that God never lies (from Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16). Your child participated in one of the following activities today. You can use these activities with your child to help your child grow with Jesus throughout the week.

God's Promises

Say this rhyme as you rock or walk with your baby:

God keeps all his promises. He's faithful, kind, and true.

Yes, God, he never, ever lies.

He'll always comfort you.

TODDLER

Raindrops

Lay a plastic tablecloth on the floor. In the center set a dishpan with about 1 inch of water in the bottom, a small sponge, and a large spoon.

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Show your toddler how to make "raindrops" by squeezing the sponge over the dishpan. If your toddler is younger and unable to squeeze the sponge, he or she can scoop and pour raindrops with the spoon.

Remind your child that God promised never to flood the world again. Reinforce that God never lies. Say this rhyme together:

Rain, rain, go away! Noah's animals want to come out and play.

2-YEAR-OLD

Rainbow Mosaic

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Help your child tear colored paper into small pieces and then throw the pieces into the air for rain.

Say: Now let's make a rainbow to remind us that God stopped the rain. God keeps all promises because God loves us. God never lies. Help your child arrange the pieces of paper to make a rainbow as you sing "Rainbow Maker" to the tune of "Did You Ever See a Lassie?"

Promises, Promises

Your parenting has much to do with how your child sees the world and God. If you have a difficult time keeping your word, vour child may come to believe that the world is an overwhelmingly scary place and that God is unreliable. Sometimes crazy threats, promises, or even lies come out of our mouths. Apologize when you mess up. Work hard to make realistic commitments and keep them.

Use these ideas to help your child become a FaithWeaver:

- Let your child make rainbows by squeezing shaving cream into a sealed plastic bag. Add drops of food coloring to the bag, and let your child work the coloring into the shaving cream.
- Wave colored scarves as you move with your child to favorite praise music.
